In the Index of Concepts the following abbreviations used throughout the book have been adopted: MRTJ for Multiple Relation Theory of Judgements; RTJ for Relation Theory of Judgements; TDn for Theory of Denoting; TDs for Theory of Descriptions; TQ for Theory of Quantification.

Many headings and subheadings are followed by the name of an author put in square brackets. This indicates that entries under that heading or subheading pertain specifically to that author. Subheadings in square brackets indicate an entry that does not strictly fall under the heading word, but is of its family.

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
