José M. de Areilza is Dean of IE Law School in Madrid, Spain. He is Professor of European Union Law and holds the Jean Monnet IE Chair. He has been a visiting professor at the National University of Singapore, the College of Europe in Warsaw, Central European University in Budapest, and William and Mary School of Law in Virginia, US. He is a member of the 'Total Law' teaching team at the Jean Monnet Center, New York University School of Law.

He received his LLB from the Universidad Complutense de Madrid, his LLM degree and Doctorate in Juridical Sciences (SJD) degree from Harvard Law School and a Master of International Relations (MA) from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Boston. He became a member of the New York Bar in 1992 and was elected to the Board of Directors of the Madrid Bar Association in 2007.

From 1996 to 2000 he was an adviser to the Spanish Prime Minister on European and North American Affairs, and in 2002 was an adviser to the Spanish Government Representative to the European Convention.

He has published extensively on European law and integration and in 2006 founded the weblog for European debate, BlogEuropa.eu.

Konstantina E. Botsiou is Associate Professor of Modern History and International Politics in the Department of Political Science and International Relations at the University of Peloponnese. Following her studies in History and Archaeology at the University of Athens, she received her Ph.D. at the University of Tübingen. From 1999 to 2008 she taught modern history in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration at the University of Athens. She is Director of Publications at the Constantinos Karamanlis Institute for Democracy and a member of the

Academic Council at the Hellenic Parliament Foundation for Parliamentaryism and Democracy. Her publications focus on modern European and Greek history, European integration history, the Cold War and transatlantic relations.

Ján Figel' is a European Christian Democrat politician and has been a Member of the European Commission responsible for Education, Training, Culture and Youth since November 2004. From May to November 2004 he was Commissioner responsible for Enterprise and Information Society.

Between 1998 and 2003 he was the chief negotiator of the Slovak Republic during its accession negotiations to the EU and the State Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Slovak Republic. He was also Member of the National Parliament, Chair of the Committee for Foreign Affairs, Slovak representative to the European Convention on the Future of Europe and Vice-Chair of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe's Committee on Economic Affairs and Development.

Over the past five years he has helped to bring education and culture to the forefront of European policymaking, making them essential elements of the Growth and Jobs Agenda and the Social Agenda. Among other things, he has decisively contributed to the launch of the European Institute for Innovation and Technology (EIT) and the University–Business Forum. The European Year of Intercultural Dialogue 2008 was his idea, and he also proposed that 2009 be declared the European Year of Creativity and Innovation.

Commissioner Figel' has been a member of the Christian Democratic Movement since its foundation in 1990. He is the author of many articles and several books. His main works include 'Slovakia on the Road to the European Union – Chapters and Contexts' (co-authored with Miroslav Adamiš) and 'Maturation for Europe (Negotiator's Chronicle)'. He has received several awards, and a number of universities have named him Honorary Professor and awarded him the title Doctor honoris causa.

Ioannis Filandros is a graduate of the History and Archaeology Department of the National and Capodistrian University in Athens. He also holds an MA in Contemporary Greek History from this Department. He is now a PhD candidate in History in the Department of History and Civilization of the European University Institute (EUI) in Florence, Italy. Here he is

studying European and Greek politics; his research interests are in the area of political parties, ideology, public policy and parliamentarianism.

Gábor G. Fodor (1975) is a Hungarian political scientist, Research Director of the Századvég Political Foundation and Assistant in the Department of Political Science of Eötvös Lóránd University, Budapest. His fields of research include political philosophy, political theory and modern Hungarian political thought. He has published more than 40 articles on topics of political philosophy and political thought. Recent books are *"Kérdéstilalom" – Eric Voegelin politikai filozófiája* ('Frageverbot': Eric Voegelin's Political Philosophy) (2004); *Gondoljuk újra a polgári radikálisokat* (Rethinking Bourgeois Radicalism) (2004); *Lú-e vagy szobor?...* (Horse or Statue ...) (2006, with István Schlett) and *Kormányzás/tudás* (Governance/Knowledge) (2008). The Hungarian Political Science Association awarded him the Kolnai Aurél Prize for the best book on political science of 2006.

Roland Freudenstein was born in 1960 in Bonn. After a two-year term of voluntary military service, he studied political science, economics, Japanese studies and international relations in Bonn and Los Angeles. After working as a Research Fellow at the German Council on Foreign Relations, he became a member of the Foreign and Security Planning staff of the European Commission in Brussels in the 1990s. Subsequently, he was appointed director of the Warsaw office of the Konrad Adenauer Foundation and later held a senior position in the Foundation's central office in Berlin. Since 2008 he has been Head of Research of the Brussels Centre for European Studies, the seat of the European People's Party. He has published extensively on European integration, security and German-Polish relations.

Jos J. A. M. van Gennip was born in 1939. After studying law at the University of Nijmegen, he held several positions. He was Deputy Director-General at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Executive Director of the Research and Policy Institute for the Christian Democratic Party. From 1991 until 2007 he was a member of the Upper Chamber of the Netherlands Parliament (Senate). In addition to his other roles, Van Gennip is now President of the *Socires* Foundation: Centre for Society and

Responsibility, a think tank studying the future of European society. He is also a member of the Board of the Netherlands Institute for Multiparty Democracy.

Jean-Dominique Giuliani has been the Chair of the Robert Schuman Foundation, of which he was one of the founders, since 2000. He served as Secretary General of the Centrist Union of the French Senate between 1981 and 1992 and directed the cabinet of René Monory, President of the Senate, from 1992 to 1998. From 1998 to 2001 he was a Director for the General Management of the Taylor Nelson Sofres Group and in 2002 Special Policy Adviser for Fleishman-Hillard (Omnicom Group). In 2002 he founded JD-G.Com International Consultants. Since 2006, he has been a special adviser to the European Commission.

Giuliani is the author of *Marchands d'influence: Les lobbies en France* (Le Seuil, 1991); *Pour l'Europe réunie* (2 vols) published in the series Les Notes (Robert Schuman Foundation, 2002); *Quinze + Dix: Le grand élargissement* (Albin Michel, 2003); *L'élargissement de l'Europe* (Que sais-je; PUF, 2005); and *Un Européen très pressé* (Editions du Moment, 2008).

Risto Harisalo is Professor of Administrative Science at the University of Tampere, Finland. He has undertaken research on creativity and innovation in public and private organisations, strategies for the privatisation of public services, and problems of regulation and deregulation. In addition he has studied the management of human resources and the features of innovative organisations. From this base he has moved on to understanding human interaction as a value-creating strategy in strategic and operative decision-making. His latest field of interest is the functioning of boards in public (local authorities and universities) and private (modern media) organisations. He has also advised public and private organisations on their strategic and practical problems.

Evanthis Hatzivassiliou is Assistant Professor of Contemporary History at the University of Athens. He is author of *The Cyprus Question, 1878–1960: The Constitutional Aspect* (Minneapolis: Minnesota Mediterranean and East European Monographs, 2002) and *Greece and the Cold War: Frontline State, 1952–1967* (London and New York: Routledge, 2006).

Torbjørn Røe Isaksen is editor of the Norwegian periodical *Minerva* and its website. He is also a researcher at the Norwegian think tank Civita. He holds an MA in Political Science from the University of Oslo. He has been President of the Norwegian Young Conservatives and has published numerous articles in some of Norway's leading newspapers and magazines. He was the editor of the book *Welfare after the Welfare State* (2003), and in 2008 he published the book *For a New Conservatism*. He participated in the US State Department's International Visitor Program in 2007 and was an official youth delegate to the UN General Assembly in 2005.

Alain Lamassoure is a Member of the European Parliament (EPP), where he is a member of the Committee on Budgets. He has just started his fourth mandate as an MEP. Previously he held various ministerial positions in France (European Affairs, Budget, and Government Spokesperson) and was a Member of the European Convention. A graduate of the Paris Institute of Political Studies and the National School of Administration, he started his career at the French Court of Auditors before being appointed adviser to the office of several Ministers (Cultural Affairs, Finance and Infrastructure) and then to the President of the Republic.

Kostas A. Lavdas is Professor of Political Science and Director of the Centre for Political Research and Documentation (KEPET) at the University of Crete, where he has served as Vice-Rector and Dean. Born in Athens in 1964, he studied political science, public policy, and international relations in Athens, Manchester, LSE and MIT. He has published extensively in English, German and Greek on European politics, Greek politics and policy, comparative interest group politics and applied political theory. He has taught and researched at various European and American universities and research centres. He is the author of several books as well as many articles in international journals (including the *European Journal of Political Research*, *West European Politics*, *Journal of Political and Military Sociology* and *Politics*). In 2007–08 he was the Constantine Karamanlis Professor of Hellenic and Southeastern European Studies at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy in the US, and in 2009 he was the National Bank of Greece Senior Research Fellow at LSE in the UK.

Matej Makarovič, born in 1970, received his MA degree from the University of Lancaster and Central European University, and his PhD from the University of Ljubljana. He works at the Faculty of Applied Social Studies at the University of Ljubljana in Slovenia. His main research interests include political sociology, societal development and modernisation, sociological theory and globalisation. He has participated in several national and international research projects, including 'Efficient and Democratic Governance in a Multi-Level Europe' and 'Eastern Enlargement – Western Enlargement: Cultural Encounters in the European Economy and Society after the Accession' within the EU 6th Framework programme.

Stefano Riela is Scientific Director at the Fondazione Res Publica (Milan), a Lecturer in Competition Policy and Regulation in ISPI (Milan), in Micro and Macroeconomics in ISIDA (Palermo), and Research Fellow in European Economic Policy in Bocconi University (Milan). He is the Italian Coordinator of the Allianz Summer Academy (Allianz Kultural Stiftung, Munich). Previously he was Director for e-Health at Sicilia e-Innovazione and consultant for the Organisation of the 2003 Italian Presidency of the Council of the European Union. He has a PhD in International Law and Economics (Università Bocconi, Milan), an MA in Economic Regulation and Competition (City University, London), an MA in International Politics (Université Libre de Bruxelles – CERIS Institute) and a degree in Business Administration (Università Bocconi).

Matevž Tomšič has a PhD in Sociology and is an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Applied Social Studies in Nova Gorica. His research interests include political sociology (i.e., elites, democracy and development in post-socialist societies) and the sociology of intellectuals. His more recent work also focuses on the role of media in relation to democracy. He has been involved in several international research projects, among them two from the 6th Framework Programme: 'Efficient and Democratic Governance in a Multi-Level Europe', and 'Eastern Enlargement – Western Enlargement: Cultural Encounters in the European Economy and Society after the Accession' (where he was leader of the national research team).
